From the Nurse

As most of you have heard, the flu season has started early this year, and there is a particularly aggressive flu virus affecting the whole country. Boston is currently experiencing an epidemic flu outbreak.

At Pelham we have seen some flu cases with high fevers, achiness and dry cough. To prevent your child from getting the flu and to contain the spread of the flu, we are encouraging anyone who is above 6 months of age to get the flu vaccine. It is not too late to be vaccinated as the season continues until March.

All students with flu like symptoms, especially fever, will be sent home until they are free of fever for a full 24 hours without the use of Tylenol or ibuprofen. If your child has a runny nose or persistent cough, we also ask that you keep your child at home, as they can spread the virus to the rest of their fellow students.

Although there is no absolute prevention for the flu or the common cold, frequent good handwashing, cleaning of toys and common surfaces, and covering coughs and sneezes with tissue greatly reduces your exposure to the flu virus. First Grade News!!!

First graders welcomed the New Year with new hopes and dreams for the remainder of first grade! We wrote New Year Resolutions which will be posted soon to remind us of what we would like to work on as a student. These included working on reading, writing and everyone decided to work on their PAWS!

In Social Studies we completed the US Symbols unit right before the holiday break. The students really enjoyed learning about all the symbols and we complementing the learning with a craft. Ms. Samuels taught us a Statue of Liberty song, which we sang at assembly. We even had one of our friends wear a crown and hold a torch through the song! Having finished this social studies unit means that we go back to another Science unit! We have started working with Simple Machines. We are learning about the 6 simple machines: wheel and axle, ramp, wedge, screw, pulley, and lever. We have been talking about how simple machines help us do work, and we looked around for examples of these simple machines being used. When you see a good example of a simple machine point it out to your child and ask him/her which simple machine it represents!

For math and ELA just like always we are work, work, working hard! I have been assessing students individually for reading and I am SO HAPPY with how much they have improved their reading and at how many more reading skills and strategies they are using! In math, we continue to learn about coins, their values, how to count them, and we continue learning how to tell time. We just started telling time by the quarter!

I am so proud of this great group of first graders, and I appreciate all the work you do with them at home. Thank you so much!

Second Grade News

Pelham second graders continue to shine in our classroom as they learn so many new things with incredible interest and excitement. In reading, we have explored a number of nonfiction stories that have been connected to our science units and have practiced using important parts of nonfiction books as well, such as the table of contents and the glossary. In the fiction stories we have read, we have also been working on identifying the characters, setting, and plot. Throughout all of our stories, we have been working to read with fluency and expression and have been answering comprehension questions to check for understanding.

In writing, students worked very hard on their first research project, first reading about a specific animal and taking notes and then going through the steps to create a final report that was presented to the class. We are working to wrap up a new writing project, where students have used Tomie dePaola as a mentor author in order to write realistic fiction stories. They have gone through the steps of planning their writing, creating their first draft and are now in the process of editing their work and writing their final drafts. They are becoming more skillful writers as the year progresses.

In our Everyday Math program, we have completed Units 2 and 3 and are reaching the end of Unit 4. Students have been practicing concepts including addition and subtraction with up to 2 digits, place value, telling time, counting money, reading graphs, solving number stories, and measuring weight, length, and temperature. Don't forget that the Everyday Math website is a great resource for students to have extra practice of the concepts that we cover in school. (www.everydaymathonline.com).

Science continues to excite us as we've covered several units over the past few months, including our study of animal habitats and rocks, including pebbles, sand and silt. Our rocks unit ended with a visit to our very own "rock museum" where we explored rock samples from our school collection and from students' personal collections as well. We also sang a rock chant for the school at our last assembly about the three different types of rocks. The students were awesome! We just completed a unit on nutrition, where students followed the adventures of the Royal Food Family to learn about the five major food groups and what they do to help our bodies stay strong and healthy. Over the next seven weeks, we will be traveling around the world to the seven continents and the major oceans, mountain ranges, landforms, and rivers to explore how people live in different parts of the Earth.





Pelham Elementary School PTO Minutes

November 13, 2012 Meeting

In attendance: Tracy Farnham, Sage Scott, Lisa Candito, Lisa Desjarlais, Jessica Hanson, Emily Marriott, Amy Wasserman, Jennifer York, Elise Stromgren

Treasurer's Report (Sage Scott): current balance \$8,914.68

Principal's Report: The laminator is very old and needs replacing. Lisa estimates it would cost approximately \$600-\$800 and asks if PTO would fund the purchase. Tracy will check on the cost of the laminator at her school (newer than Pelham's). Lisa suggests that Pelham families keep an eye out for information about regionalization in upcoming school committee meetings. The current student body make up at Pelham school is about 1/2 school choice and 1/2 Pelham residents. The school choice funds aren't enough to sustain the school. If the school closed, the town would need to pay for approximately 60 students into neighboring communities. A poll last year showed that Pelham school families do not support mixed-grade classrooms.

Genevieve's Fundraiser: Sage reports that we took in \$2,517.45 in orders and got back \$1,496.70 in profits.

Wreath Sale: the sixth grade will not be taking on this fundraiser this year. There were (this year and have been in previous years) comments from parents who feel a wreath sale does not include all families as not all families observe the Christmas holiday. The PTO decides not to take on this additional fundraiser at this time but to revisit it next year as it is/was a popular fundraiser with many families participating.

Pelham School "Spirit" t-shirts: a drop box will be located in the school entrance for families to recycle shirts and/or to swap out a small shirt for a larger one. Lisa C. and Emily will work on an order form and flyer for the shirts and to describe the drop box. Amy asks about the use of the word "bully" in the shirt and expresses concern about using the word "bully." The PTO may want to consider this next year as the shirt design is in place and an order for more shirts has been placed. Sage notes that the t-shirt company has yet to cash the check from the PTO to pay for the new shirts this year.

Halloween Party: Nora Marolis coordinated the party; it was a success. PTO paid about \$260 for supplies for the party and we took in about \$100 in food and other sales, UMass volunteers were excellent, everyone seemed to have a good time and the party seemed to be calmer than other years.

Shed Staining: Elise reported that the shed was stained Sunday October 20 and in early November, volunteer stainers were Ruth Carolan, Chelsea Gwyther, Lennie Ware, Lindsay Stromgren, Hattie Carolan, James Kurpaska, Emma Gwyther, Merissa Stromgren, Lily Plotkin and Merrick Stromgren. Cost of staining supplies was approximately \$140; Elise will get receipts to Sage for reimbursement.


