Dear Pelham School Families,

We had a lovely all-school assembly this Wednesday and for the second year in a row, the Pelham Council on Aging was in attendance and treated all students to a holiday treat at the conclusion of the program. Many family members joined us as well for the fun. Fifth and sixth grade chorus students sang several songs, fifth grade students sang a rap about the 13 original colonies, and first and second grade students sang a very lively and unique version of the Twelve Days of Christmas. The whole school was taught a song at the end of the performance and everyone present sang it beautifully in rounds. We thank Emily Samuels, our music and movement teacher for working with our students to prepare for this fun performance.

I would like to alert parents to some problems we have been having with students files and folders being moved around on our school server. Due to the extent and level of the changes being made, we are feeling that these actions have been deliberate and it has caused much confusion and distress amongst students and staff. It is difficult to ascertain when/where this is happening, but we will continue to investigate this issue and have reminded students of the acceptable use contract that was signed and returned at the beginning of the year. I have included some relevant language from the Pelham School Handbook for your information:

“All school computers are to be used in a responsible, efficient, ethical and legal manner. The codes of conduct of the schools apply to Internet activities, and this acceptable use policy should therefore be considered an extension of the behavior codes.

*Individuals who log on to the Internet at school are responsible for all activities while using their account. **Unethical or illegal use of school computers will be cause for disciplinary action, including revocation of network access privileges and or legal action. Examples of such inappropriate uses include unauthorized access into school accounts or private files, destruction of others’ files, harassment of students or staff, introduction of computer viruses, commercial use of the school networks, violation of copyright laws, use of inappropriate language, and transmission of or searches for obscene materials.**”*

Please review these policies with your student again and remind them of their responsibilities in the use of the computers in either the school or library.

We would like to thank Mr. Bruce Klotz for donating many hours of his time and expertise to hang the new Pelham School curtains. This has been a project many years in the making that has finally come to fruition. The PTO and After-School program generously donated funds for the purchase of the curtains, and Pelham School finally has curtains that are beautifully made and can actually open and close!!

Chorus and Music/Movement Integration

In our November all-school “sharing” assembly, Grade 5/6 chorus sang songs with a food focus; their skill in singing rounds continues to grow. In correlation with their study of germs, 1st grade sang a hand washing song for the school. Thanks to the use of the laptop computer and projector, the whole school was able to join together to quickly learn and sing some Thanksgiving songs. We all enjoyed the feeling of community spirit. Kindergarten songs and movement continue to be related to letter sounds of the week, as well as seasonally appropriate material. Fifth grade has completed creating and is now rehearsing a chant/rap using the names of the 13 colonies. Sixth grade has begun to learn a song that utilizes and reinforces the vocabulary of plate tectonics; it will soon become a contra/circle dance!

News from the Art Studio

It is hard to believe it is December already. With the exception of kindergarten, each grade level completed a project using a variety of printmaking techniques. **Kindergarteners** have made patterned snakes using primary colors and learned about transparent, translucent and opaque, to make "stained glass" light catchers. They also completed a pen and watercolor family portrait and a bouquet of flowers, inspired by the artist, Pablo Picasso. **First graders** added embellishments to a stamped robot and viewed work by the artist, Wassily Kandinsky and his use of line and color to show expression. First graders explored line and color mixing to paint abstract line design paintings. **Second graders** completed a relief printmaking project, exploring variations of lines and designs, "carving" into Styrofoam. The second grade prints were then finalized by extending lines and designs off the edge of the print using oil pastels. The results are stunning. **Third grade's** stamped radial symmetry project is on display in the halls. They recently looked at the artwork of printmaker, Wayne Thiebaud. Thiebaud is well known for his monotype prints of cakes and desserts. Third graders practiced drawing 3 dimensional ellipses and blending with oil pastels to create decadent and fanciful layered cakes. For a sculpture project, third graders have constructed wooden animals which will be painted like the traditional Oaxacan animals of Oaxaca, Mexico. **Grade four** artists printed their collagraph prints, added oil pastels for color and mounted their final products. They are now working on three dimensional line designs which have them practicing shading value gradations using colored pencil. **Fifth grade** began a figure study lesson. They constructed their own "mannequin" to aid in drawing the figure in different poses. Following figure sketch practice, they looked at artwork by the sculptor Alberto Giacometti and began their own tinfoil figures in action poses. **Grade six** just completed and mounted their relief prints of animals. Recently they have worked on a collaging project making miniature houses.

Recent News From Music Class

12/19/2011

Kindergarten students played a steady beat on different percussion instruments to accompany their singing of the song "Heart Keeps A-beating." They played drums to express the heart beat, guiros for breathing, woodblocks for the clock and jingle bells

for the rain. They also used the bells to accompany the “B section” of Mozart’s “Sleigh Bells” from his German dances, which has an ABA form.

First grade students played the Do and Sol sounds on the tone bells, and percussion instruments to express the knocking and tapping in the song “Who’s that Knocking at the Window?” They also played their selected instruments at the appropriate times to the song “A Sailor Went to Sea” and created movements to the steady beat in the singing game “All Around the Kitchen.”

Second grade students learned about the whole note and whole rest in the Native American chant “Ayo” and filled up the four beat rests by playing the rhythm sticks. They also started to sing simple two part rounds such as “Scotland’s Burning” and “My Paddle.” The first one they also performed with hand jives and body percussion in a double circle.

Third grade students have looked at pictures and listened to the sounds of instruments of the orchestra. They learned about the families of these instruments and sang a round that imitates their sound. They also discovered the form of Tchaikovsky’s “Russian Dance” from the “Nutcracker” and performed movements following the musical sections.

Fourth grade students learned about the opera, discussed the story and listened to the arias of the main characters from Mozart’s “Magic Flute.” They also discovered how cleverly Mozart treated the classical rondo form in his “Turkish March.” They enjoyed using the flowing material strips to express the form of this piece through movement.

Fifth and sixth grade students accompanied their singing of the Brazilian song “La Conga” on the traditional percussion instruments. Mr. A. the student teacher taught a fun chant “Clean Up Your Room!” After learning to say the three parts with the correct rhythm, they stopped the speech and played the parts on the instruments.

Fifth grade students danced the American novelty dance “Count 64” and **sixth grade** students danced the “Mexican Mixer” with a partner change at every turn.
