As stated in the introduction, parents/guardians are responsible for ensuring their children ages 6-16 are in school everyday, on time. Childcare for Early Release Days

Quinlan's Quill

Fifth grade is wrapping up the River Unit this week and will begin the American Revolution next week. The students are finishing their literature books on Monday which they have thoroughly enjoyed. Both books were written by Gary Paulson and I hope they will all pick up another book by him to enjoy.

Also, we finished our first pieces of writing which were personal narrative paragraphs and a non-fiction expository piece about a river that they chose. We will now focus on transition words and how you use them in different ways depending on the topic. After we have done numerous paragraphs using the different transition words, we will write respond to prompts based on the Revolution Unit.

In math we had our first math test and are now moving onto Multiplication and continuing our study of algebra. Students will be creating their own algebraic expressions in Guess and Check word problems, an investigations unit called Growth Patterns, and in other word problems. This is a very difficult concept for students but an important one for their mathematical thinking.

Our Enhancement Block, Wordly Wise and Spelling programs are up and running. Students seem to understand the systems and the rhythm of the week. We are definitely in a rhythm and the students are responding well to the structure and consistency.

I have seen many of you at conferences and look forward to seeing the rest of you in the coming weeks. I look forward to watching your children continue to grow and learn.

Sixth Grade News

Oct. 20, 2011

Congratulations to the sixth graders for completing their first unit math test this week. The scores were quite good, and the students should be proud of themselves for working so hard. The tests will be coming home for parent signatures soon. Our next unit, measurement, started Wednesday. Beginning with linear measurement, we will learn about standard and metric units, and then we'll move on to area and volume.

Our River unit is wrapping up with a test on Friday. The students learned about our local Fort River, the Connecticut River, rivers in ancient cultures, and major rivers that interest us. We have some photos posted in the classroom from our two field trips, so stop by and take a look. Our next unit is Maps and Globes, which will begin with a look at our solar system, then our planet and moon, and then a study of how we organize ourselves into continents, countries, and eventually all way down to using latitude and longitude to identify physical location.

We have several things happening in language arts right now. We are finishing up our river literature, and will look at folklore next. We are studying capitalization rules and will begin reading skills on Monday, with a focus on identifying time sequence. Students have been writing sentences that we've used to study parts of speech as well as the different ways sentences are structured (simple, compound, complex). The personal narratives that students wrote were very entertaining. They will be bringing them home for signatures within the next week, and we will talk about the students' organization, details, use of voice and word choice at conferences.

Please continue to help your children learn their weekly spelling and vocabulary words. They know they should be practicing the words daily, and having someone at home work with them can be a boost. We also need some help from home with staying

organized, particularly with papers that need signatures and then to be returned to school within two days. Thank you for all that you do for your children.
