Dear Pelham School Families,

There will be an additional School Committee meeting next Wednesday evening to discuss the merits of forming a "Regional School District Planning Committee". The purpose of the committee will be to join together with another town/s to study regionalization and ultimately present a recommendation back to our town. The School Committee will take a vote as to whether to put an article on the Fall Town Meeting Warrant requesting permission to form this committee.

The Pelham School is seeking one parent to join our Pelham School Council. The School Council is a representative, school building-based committee composed of the principal, parents, teachers, community members required to be established by each school pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 71, Section 59C. The function of the Council is to assist the principal in adopting educational goals for the school, identifying the educational needs of students, reviewing the school's annual budget, and formulating and revising a school improvement plan. Meetings are held once a month on Wednesday mornings, from 7:30-8:30. Please complete the School Council Interest Form at the back of this newsletter and return to the school office if you are interested. Elections will be held on Curriculum Night on October 5th, and the first meeting will be on October 12th.

Parents are welcomed as additional chaperones on class field trips, as volunteers in the school library, and as helpers with special classroom projects. State and Federal law requires that school volunteers pass a CORI check. In order to work in classrooms and chaperone on Field Trips parents **must** complete a CORI form. Please contact the school office to process your CORI form if you would like to participate this year.

The "Power of One" group visited Pelham School this week in an anti-bullying program for all students. The show was a skit-based performance that reviewed all aspects of the bullying process in educational detail. The message of the show was that every child has the "Power of One", the power to report and deal with bullying when they see it. Both teachers and students thoroughly enjoyed the program, and I have included some photos on the next page of students that were participants. Thank you Deb King for being so quick with the camera!

Fifth grade is getting into the full swing of learning and beginning to get our programs up and running. The first couple of days were a lot of assessments and the students really worked hard. I am getting to know the students socially and their learning style. It is a great group of kids and I am looking forward to this year.

Fifth graders are learning that I love index cards. Before we begin a unit, we always go over vocabulary for that unit. So, yesterday students started studying their river cards and their math vocabulary cards. Studying consistently 10 minutes a night helps the vocabulary become part of their long term memory. The language of learning is vital to success.

In reading we are learning about ourselves as readers and choosing "Just Right Books". They are also reading for an extended period of time while students are being met one-on-one with teachers to assess their reading skills. It is always interesting to hear what students are reading, and how they feel about reading.

This week we are beginning our first piece of processed writing which is a Personal Narrative paragraph. Students have done this many times and we will focus on descriptive language, voice and creating a picture in their heads. We will also learn the writing process that we do in 5th grade.

Our math program is up and running. We are starting with the basics of place value and will quickly move into mathematical properties and algebraic expressions. We will also begin our problem solving program in the near future. Students will have problem solving work every week which will be appropriate for their level, and they will move at their own pace. Also, we will have strategy weeks where we will focus on one problem solving strategy for that week.

We are all figuring out how the 5th grade works and how this year can be successful for all students. We are a social group and it will be important to learn when it is appropriate to be social and when it is not.

I look forward to seeing everyone on October 5th which is Open House. As always my door is open to parents. I truly feel we are a team and need to work together.

Sixth Grade News

September 14, 2011

We've had a busy start to the school year. In addition to various assessments, we've been talking about ourselves as learners and how to stay healthy. When we examined our eating habits, we looked at the new "My Plate" food recommendations and the need to limit excess salt, fat, and sugar. It was particularly interesting to measure out the 11 teaspoons of sugar that are in a typical can of root beer. We'll all have a healthy year if we eat well, get enough sleep, exercise daily, and manage our stress.

We are one of several classrooms in the building that start each morning with a Morning Meeting, as developed by the Responsive Classroom folks. We call our time "Morning Circle" and it includes a greeting, sharing, activity and message. We've had fun together and made some connections that we expect will enhance the social atmosphere of the classroom. We have the "CARES" list posted in our room, as we work on our skills of cooperation, assertion, responsibility, empathy and self-control.

In math we are working through our first unit, teaching students the mathematical concepts, as well as how the math program is organized. Every day we correct homework, have a lesson on new material, try a few problems with a check by the teachers, then have independent practice work. Our program also includes Problem Solving books students use to solve word problems and explain their thinking. In sixth grade we assign math homework every night.

Our river unit is underway and it includes field trips, science experiments, river literature, and a study of ancient civilizations. Our science and social studies units this year include Maps and Globes, Experiments with Plants, Physics, Robotics (hopefully), and Health. We will be writing various process pieces including a personal narrative, descriptive essays, a persuasive essay, a research report, various expository paragraphs, book summaries, and a business letter. We will read historical fiction, realistic fiction, biographies, poetry, and folklore together. In addition to the subjects we study, we address organizational and social skills. Thank you for helping your children transition back to school – this is a pivotal year and the expectations are high.
