Dear Pelham School Families,

We were all treated to a view of the colder days to come this morning with the arrival of snow and icy walks. It feels as if we have just left summer and are now launching much too quickly into colder weather. Please remind your children to dress warmly and remember to dig out the winter wear from last season. Students must have on snow boots to venture in the snow during recess times, and when the snow becomes deeper, snow pants are a must.

The entire school enjoyed our first all school assembly this past Wednesday, led by Emily Samuels, our new music and movement teacher. Emily works with teachers in their classroom on integrating classroom curriculum through music and movement. The 'Sharing' began with grades 5 & 6 performing the songs that they had been learning in chorus, followed up by first grade students singing a song about caterpillars that they had learned in their butterfly unit. Fourth grade students performed a poem chant they had learned accompanied by instruments and the whole school learned a Halloween chant with movements that we played with as a whole school. It was a wonderful opportunities for students to share their learning and come together as a school community!

During the spring of last year, parents received information about a new screening tool that Pelham School had adopted called Measures of Academic Progress (MAP). This assessment will be administered three times a year to students in grades 1-6, and grade K in the spring only. This basic skills test identifies which basic skills and concepts your child understands in reading and mathematics as well as identifying areas which may be more challenging. Parents were informed last spring that they would receive information as to how their student performed in the fall of this year. This information will be shared either in parent conferences or will be sent home to you. As some students just completed make-up testing today, the Student Goal Setting sheets were not available yet for discussion with your child's teacher if you have met already. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact us here at the school.

I am looking for several parent volunteers for a small school improvement project. We have two areas outside our gym containing multiple potted plants. The two areas are in much need of some TLC to spruce up the plants and lay down a new layer of rocks. We have all of the materials, but need some extra hands willing and able to do this work. Third Grade News

We had a wonderful field trip to Harvard Forest. Thank you to all the volunteers that helped make the day so enjoyable. Our weather was perfect for our hike, and everyone seemed to learn much about the forest and how it changes because of creatures, people, time, and weather.

I am very happy with the dedication third graders are putting into their studies. In Reading, we are currently ensconced in a realistic fiction unit where groups of children are reading novels together as well as independently. Each student is focusing on a main character. They are developing a profile of the character and supporting their opinions with evidence from the text. They will also be comparing and contrasting their main characters across novels.

Students have just completed their personal narrative writing piece. Their assignment was to write about a time that had some emotional impact. After brainstorming ideas, children drew four pictures that told the story. These then become the organizer for their four paragraph story. We are looking forward to sharing them with each other.

We are coming to a close in our second addition, subtraction, and the number system math unit. We have been reading, modeling, writing, comparing, and ordering whole numbers into the hundred thousands place. We have learned and/or practiced various strategies to solve three digit addition and subtraction word problems. We have also reviewed telling time, and practiced figuring out elapsed time. It would be very helpful at home to have your child tell time on an analog clock at least once a day. You can also ask questions about what time it would be in 30 minutes or 20 minutes. The more your child practices this, the more automatic it will become.

Our weather has come to a close. We have studied air temperature, moisture, wind speed and direction, cloud types, and precipitation. We have used a number of weather instruments to collect data about our daily weather. Our work has also involved differentiating between weather and climate, reading weather maps, and describing how the water cycle works.

I appreciate the time you are giving to checking over homework and signing the reading log when 20 minutes or more of reading has been done. It's great to see so many children reading beyond the 20 minute minimum. Students are developing some strong study skills in this class!

Fourth Grade Pelham Press

We have been very busy in fourth grade. In math, we have been studying number sense. More specifically we have been looking at place value and larger numbers. Students are working on comparing numbers using “greater than” and “less than” symbols, and organizing groups of numbers from least to greatest (and *vice versa*.) We are also revisiting money. Students have been calculating combinations of quarters, dimes and nickels. As a final math project, students will browse various book order forms and try to generate a list of selections that will get them close to 100 dollars without going over. They then check each other’s arithmetic for accuracy.

In writing, students have become very aware of how important capital letters, end punctuation, and sentence fluency are when presenting a finished piece of writing. Throughout the process of writing, children have been taking time to use spelling references to ensure they turn in the best work possible. We have completed a variety of writing activities where complete sentences and thorough, thoughtful answers are needed.

As we wrap up our Native American unit we will begin to explore the cultural exchange that took place as Europeans began arriving in the New World. Each culture has its own way of life, but the intersection of these two groups of people created a new way of life that exists to this day. Students are reading a variety of books that give them information about both lifestyles. We will all be reading People of the Breaking Day, a book that provides a comprehensive overview of the Wampanoag's life in historic times. From games and recreation to leadership and political structures, this book has it all. It is a wonderful documentation of early American life.

We continue to probe into the magnificent world of geography. Understanding legends, keys, and symbols is central to comprehending what maps are telling us about our world. Students have studied special maps that enable them to look at desert, plains, coastal, and mountain regions. I was impressed by how much knowledge they brought with them from the earlier grades. We will practice identifying the shape of each state and the characteristics of each region in the United States. As an extension activity, students will begin memorizing capitals.
