We are very lucky to have an intern this semester. Sarah Moore is a Mount Holyoke student who will be working with the 5th grade this semester. She wrote a paragraph to introduce herself to all of you. I encourage you to read it and introduce yourself to Sarah.

Fifth graders continue to work hard. We are trying to wrap up units before February vacation. We will complete the Constitution Unit and the Literature and Writing Units before the break. Students are reenacting the Constitutional Convention in play form as a final project of the Constitution Unit which they seem to be enjoying. Our biographies will be done before the break and some students are creating power point presentations to go along with the biographies.

In Math we have begun our study of fractions which we will continue after vacation. Also, Sarah will be teaching a mini geometry unit and a mini poetry unit next week which may carry over to after vacation.

After vacation, we will be starting our Ecosystem unit and Research Papers. Also, we will begin to prep for MCAS ELA test which is at the end of March. We will inform you of the dates as soon as we plan as a staff.

I hope everyone has a good vacation and maybe there will be some snow!

Sixth Grade News

In math, we are ending our 4th unit, operations with fractions and decimals, which means we are half way through the 6th grade curriculum! We will have the test next week. We can add, subtract, multiply and divide fractions and decimals. Our unit ended with writing algebraic expressions such as: 5 fewer than $\frac{5}{6}$ the amount, and solving equations such as: 2 divided by $\frac{3}{4} = 4 \frac{1}{4}$. I have been impressed with students' flexible thinking and perseverance.

Our Robotics unit is underway, featuring Lego NXT robots. We are programming them to perform several tasks as if they were planetary rovers, needing to maneuver around rough terrain. After teams figured out how to make the robot drive forward in a figure eight shape, they experimented with speed, and are currently building touch sensors and programming their robots to say "ouch" when they bump into something.

We have been learning about ancient cultures for the research reports. After two weeks of taking note cards, students have organized them into categories, crafted thesis statements, written outlines and introductions, and are now writing the reports. Our areas of study include ancient Mesopotamia, China, Cambodia, Egypt, Rome, Greece, and the Maya, and topics include slavery, industry, religious practices, architecture, hieroglyphics, theater, and gladiators, among others. The students are also creating artifacts for our own "6th grade museum" being displayed outside our classroom in the glass case.

Last, in language arts, we are finishing up our focus on the reading skill of identifying "main idea" in a passage, and learning rules about using commas. It's busy! Thank you for your donations of granola bars and tissues.

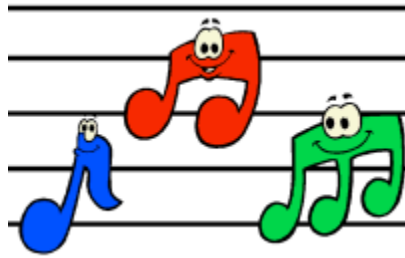

Music Curriculum Notes

I have read the books “Clifford We Love You” and “Mama Don’t Allow” to the students in **Kindergarten**. The students sang the songs in the books and accompanied their singing on the percussion instruments. They also took turns playing ten kinds of instruments (each with its own number) with the African American spiritual about the band of the ten angels. The same class enjoyed playing interactive singing and movement games, such as “Little Sally Water,” “Grandma, Grandma, Sick in Bed,” and “Partner, Won’t You Clap with Me?”

First grade students sang the African American spirituals “I’m on My Way” and “This Little Light of Mine,” the lullaby “Hush Little Baby” and a relaxing song, “Peaceful Waters.” They enjoyed performing the song, “My Brand New Drum” using percussion instruments. The same students discovered the AABCA form of Virgil Thomson’s “Walking Song” and expressed the form through motion, using scarves. They had fun guessing their peers identity by listening to their singing voice in the Japanese game “Kagome” and showed their social skills playing “Bow to Your Partner.”

Second grade students sang rounds, such as “Scott Land’s Burning” and the Native American “My Paddle.” They discovered the octaves in the songs and counted the musical steps. Other two part songs included the Russian “Mir/Peace” and “Cookie” from Trinidad, a song that they accompanied on the bells. **Second and third grade** students Played the “Bluebird” game **and along with fourth grade** students sang several African American spirituals such as “Come and Go With Me to That Land,” “This Little Light” and played “Shoo Lie Loo” a singing game from the same tradition.

Third grade students Enjoyed playing four kinds of instruments to accompany their singing of the accumulative song, “We Are Fine Musicians.” They also used xylophones to play the accompaniment to the Mexican song “Chiapanecas.” African American songs included “Sold off to Georgie” and the call response song “Long John.” **Third and fourth grade** students learned about the triplets (three eighth notes played on one beat) in the “Ecology Round” and enjoyed the singing/movement activity to the song, “Moving so Free.” **Fourth, fifth and sixth grade** students had fun using the ball in the singing game “Pop Goes the Weasel.”

Fourth grade students discussed musical vocabulary words in the song “Music for the World,” which they also sang beautifully. They took turns improvising 16 beat phrases on the drums to the rhyme, “My Mother, Your Mother” and performed the Israeli dance “Mayim.”

Fourth, fifth and sixth grade students Sang The National Anthem “Star Spangled Banner” and solved a word puzzle about the history and origin of the song.

Fifth and sixth grade students layered five different rhythms in a drum/percussion circle, and in the next lesson experienced playing polyrhythm, (several time signatures played at the same time) which is one of the main elements of all African American music. The same students sang African American partner spirituals such as “Oh When The Saints Go Marching in” and” This Train.” **All the students** played the African American children’s game “Oh Won’t You Sit Down.”

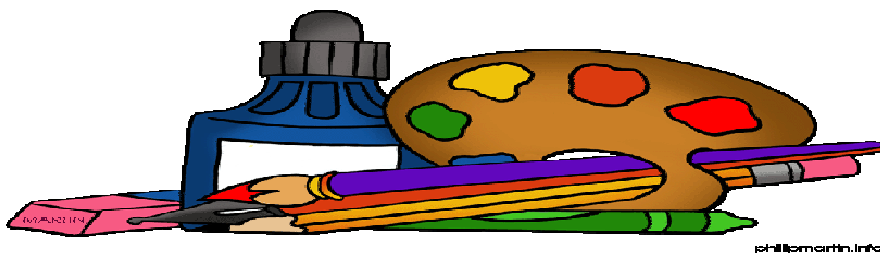
Chorus and Music/Movement Integration

In our December all-school “sharing” assembly, Grade 5/6 chorus sang songs with a winter theme. Led by the 1st grade, everyone learned a very active version of the “12 Days of Christmas”; we also sang a lovely round celebrating light. Fifth grade performed their “rap” about the 13 colonies to great acclaim.

In classrooms, integration has taken many forms. Kindergarten and 1st learned songs in keeping with their study of light related holidays, while 2nd sang about the continents and their important rivers and mountains. Third grade learned a challenging and finger tapping “Multiply Your Fingers Blues” to reinforce memorizing the times tables. Fourth grade is singing songs from the Civil Rights movement in conjunction with their work in Social Studies; 5th grade learned and performed, beautifully, a musical version of the Preamble to the Constitution. Not to be outdone, 6th grade sang and danced their way through the vocabulary of their study of tectonic plates.

At the combined string, band, and chorus concert on February 1st, the chorus presented their favorites from the term; they showed their skills in singing in unison, in partner harmony, with descant, and in round. A lot of wonderful music was heard!

Pelham students celebrated the Chinese New Year this year participating in various dragon activities, or Sumi-e brush painting techniques. It was lovely to see the variety of all the dragons and explore Chinese brush painting.

Kindergarten just completed some art work inspired by the artist Sonia Delaunay. Delaunay's work uses lots of circles. Kindergarten artists stamped and traced circles and then completed work with oil pastels and watercolors.

First graders focused on circle designs and decorated recycled CD's to make their own spin top this week. Bey Blades are a big hit in my house recently and the opportunity to use recycled objects and make our own version of Beyblades was irresistible.

Second graders began a lesson on overlapping snakes. They learned how to draw parallel lines and overlapping objects, to make snakes look intertwined. Next week, they will focus on patterns, designs and color families.

Third grade practiced drawing three dimensional letters and looked at the work of Robert Indiana. He is the sculptor and painter is best known for his sculpture of the word love, in NY on 6th avenue. With Valentine's Day around the corner, it seemed like a great project.

Fourth graders began a cross hatching landscape activity. Practicing one point perspective, horizon lines, 3 dimensional buildings and cross hatching.

Grade five has continued our figure study. After making three dimensional sculptures of figures, inspired by artist, Alberto Giacometti, students are now completing a figure drawing lesson.

Sixth grade has been working on contour line drawings. They are completing a contour line drawing of a shoe, and adding some realistic, some imaginative settings.

February is Black History month. Many grade levels will be looking at the art of famous Black African Americans and participating in projects inspired by their work.

A handful of snow inspired activities are on hold, should we ever have snow this winter. With the weather we have had, they may wait until next year.
